FROM PASTOR JOHN

Remember...Rejoice...Rededicate. The theme for WUMC's 200th anniversary celebration orients us to the past, present, and future of our church. Last Sunday's gathering at Temple Beth Torah in Old Wethersfield was a trip down memory lane, an opportunity to reconnect with the physical roots of our congregation. The attendance, spirit, and content of this event were truly exceptional! Thanks to the Anniversary Committee for orchestrating the activity, and especially to *Grace Hayes* for serving as the liaison between our church and representatives of the synagogue.

This foray into the past will be followed by another event which will re-center us in the present and future. The April 27 workshop led by *Rev. Scott Summerville* is not an official part of our anniversary celebration, but it is highly relevant to it. In 2022, WUMC adopted a Congregational Covenant that set forth biblically-grounded principles to guide our relationships with one another as a faith community. The workshop will focus on how to put these principles into practice. It will address questions such as, "What does it really look like to 'speak the truth in love' in church meetings and private conversations?" "How do we communicate our feelings and convictions with honesty, but also with civility?" "How do we disagree without being disagreeable?" "How do we respond to conflict situations in ways that are helpful rather than harmful?"

Our resource person for this event, Scott Summerville, is one of my best friends and most valued mentors in pastoral ministry. He is a highly-trained and experienced specialist in organizational life and conflict resolution. But he will not simply come to us as an "answer man" to the questions mentioned above. He will engage us in a process that will allow us to discover and implement our own answers.

I cannot urge you strongly enough to take advantage of this opportunity to enhance your interpersonal skills and, in so doing, to help build up the body of Christ. Advance reservations will be helpful since food for lunch needs to be ordered, but walk-ins are welcome. Here again are the details of our two-part workshop day:

"Celebrating and Strengthening Our Covenant Community," 9:00 a.m. – 12:00 noon; Old Fellowship Hall; open to all members; designed to equip ourselves to embody more fully the spirit and principles of our Congregational Covenant.

Complimentary lunch, 12:00 noon

"Responding Effectively to Conflict," 1:00 – 3:00 p.m., Old Fellowship Hall; open to all, but specifically tailored to help church leaders engage in conversations that lead to conflict resolution.

200th ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION CORNER

200 Years Ago...

On April 18, 1824, the cornerstone of the first Methodist church in Wethersfield was laid. "The long clapboard structure was built upon a tract of one-quarter acre, on which was standing the old-fashioned one-story dwelling house demolished in 1882. That house was at times used as a parsonage and at times rented out." In 1846, the pulpit was moved from the front to the back of the sanctuary and the pews turned around. By the 1877 arrival of the Rev. C. J. North, the building needed repair. "Much of the work was done by his own hands, though he was aided by members of the church. The interior was improved but the exterior of the building still retained its forbidden and forsaken look."




In April of 1880, the Rev. George L. Colburn preached his first sermon "with feelings of sadness mixed with hope. There stood the old church, against which the blasts of nearly 60 winters had beaten. Grim and bald as Horeb, a silent monument of a mighty past and a heroic race. Like Nehemiah he saw Zion in a ruined state and his soul was stirred within him. The cause of God and humanity demanded a change. The waste places must be repaired, Jerusalem must be rebuilt, the temple must be restored, and her altars renewed." After months of prayerful consideration, Rev. Colburn called a meeting on October 1, 1880 that led to the voting on a resolution appointing him to act "as financial agent of the trustees and stewards ... to collect money for a building committee." A sum of \$2,500 was raised. (This event is documented in the handwritten record books the 200th anniversary committee has been reviewing.)

Subsequently, the structure was jacked up from the stone foundation and moved 22 feet east and 4 feet south. Have you ever wondered how that original cornerstone, with the April 18, 1824 inscription still visible, could be near our Prospect Street Memorial Garden, even as the 130 Main Street building still stands? Well, we brought it with us in 1959!

Then, the old house was razed. Excavation began on March 17, 1882 and was completed on April 5 of the same year. "Considerable of the labor of excavating was contributed by friends of the society. An edition was made to the east end, a good cellar built under the whole, old-style windows replaced with others of modern design with cathedral glass. Uncomfortable seats were replaced, a 20 x 30 foot room was added for society gatherings and Sunday school with library closets, and an 80 foot tower with spire added." After purchasing the building in 1960, Temple Beth Torah made modifications, including repair of those windows and removal of the steeple.

This information is mostly found in the Brief Historical Sketch of the Wethersfield M. E. Church written by Rev. George L. Colburn and published in 1882. It contains many advertisements paid for by local town and Hartford businesses, such as the Hartford Life and Annuity Insurance Company, Plimpton manufacturer of paper goods, and local seed companies. "That the new church may be dedicated free of all indebtedness we have issued this little book, believing there are very few who will not aid us to the amount of 15 cents." Three very worn originals have survived. Copies of selected pages are displayed on the hallway bulletin board near the Old Fellowship Hall. A program entitled Dedicatory Services of the Wethersfield M.E. Church, Thursday, September 7, 1882 is also posted there.






Free Recycling Resources for Churches

Our new pastor, Rev. Dr. Marion Ryan Hubbard

As of July 1, our new pastor will be Rev. Dr. Marion Ryan Hubbard. She had previously served with us back in 2021 for 4 months while Rev. Beckford was on leave. Listed below is her biographical information



Rev. Dr. Marion Ryan Hubbard is a member of the New York Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church with 20 years of service in parish ministry as an ordained Elder. She has served as a pastor to seven churches in the New York Annual Conference. She earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in Psychology from Post University. She also holds a Master's of Divinity and a Doctor of Ministry degree from Drew University. Her doctorate dissertation was "A Guide to a Faith-Based Support Group for Adults Who Personally Experienced Childhood Trauma."

Marion has done extensive work in ministry in Ghana, Africa. In her ten years of service to the Ghanaian people, she was a co-founder of the Project Dorcas Medical Clinic in the north of Ghana in Tamale, bringing much-needed medical assistance to the wonderful people of the rural Yapalla Village and surrounding areas. She has also been a part of the Kairos International prison ministry team serving over 10 years in the Connecticut prison system.

Being a New Yorker, born and raised with a love of adventure, has taken her on many exciting journeys with God at her side. She has traveled to many

states across the U.S. and around the world including Korea, China, India, Turkey, Jerusalem, Germany, the Czech Republic, England, Ireland, and Scotland.

In 1981, Marion became a single mom and left New York City with her three children and settled in Bethel, CT. As God would have it, twelve years later, the love of her life appeared, and she married for a second time to a wonderful man, Robert Hubbard. Between them, they have ten children and twenty-one grandchildren. They were married for 31 wonderful years until Bob's passing this past January from Dementia. In 2018, Marion retired from active ministry at the New York Annual Conference to take care of her husband who developed dementia. For the past six years, they have lived in Tequesta, FL, and attended First United Methodist of Jupiter, FL. She has been active in her local United Methodist church, serving wherever needed, preaching on occasion, visiting the shut-ins, and running Bible studies and support groups during the year. She is currently working part-time as a Counselor for Community Christian Counseling Center.

Her mother always stated, "Going out with Marion is like going on an adventure; you never know where you will end up." Pastor Marion is so excited to be joining us again to continue the journey of bringing God's love to Wethersfield and beyond.


